EC 211 Intermediate Microeconomics, Section 1 Tues & Thurs, 3:30 pm - 4:45 pm CCE, Room 209

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Course Description: This course examines issues related to microeconomics. Microeconomics is the study of how firms and households interact with each other in the marketplace. As such, we will study consumer preferences, utility functions, consumer maximization, game theory, market structures, indifference curves, isoquants, and market failures. The purpose of this course is to expand on topics studied in Principles of Microeconomics. While many of the concepts should be familiar to students already, students will be asked to examine these ideas with a more formal and mathematical treatment.

Prerequisites: EC 111

Note: Much of the class will utilize graphical analysis, calculus, and algebra in order to address current issues.
